ENG 237 Oral Communication

(Hybrid/On-line Course)
Course ID: ENG 237, 3 SCH

Course Catalogue Description: This course is designed to improve the students' interpersonal, intrapersonal and public communication abilities to analyze topics, support assertions with proof, amplify ideas, structure messages, use language in appropriate and imaginative ways, and deliver messages with effective vocal and physical behavior. The content touches upon the history, theories, and professional practices of speech communication. Sensitivity to intercultural diversity is a part of the course.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to demonstrate the following skills:

- Develop and deliver purposeful presentations designed to increase knowledge, to foster understanding, or to promote change in the listeners' attitudes, values, beliefs, or behaviors.
- Clearly express ideas in appropriate academic language, demonstrating reasoning, an understanding of audience, context, and the mechanics of academic writing in an organized, clear, and coherent manner.

Performance Indicators:

Specifically, students will:

- Articulate thoughts in an organized and purposeful manner through oral presentations.
- Research, synthesize, organize, and document materials for presentation in both oral and written discourse.
- Analyze oral presentations for techniques, content, and purpose.
- Critique oral presentations for biases, strengths and weaknesses.

3. Edvance 360 Account: All students are required to enroll in Edvance 360. Pertinent information regarding this educational resource will be provided.

Students are expected to log onto E360 regularly to complete the Learning Modules. All of your lessons, resources, discussions, activities and assignments are located there. **Students MUST complete the assignments in the Learning Modules in chronological order** because the next assignment relies on their knowledge and understanding of the previous assignment.

4. Attendance: Class will adhere to the following attendance policy: Students should attend all classes unless excused for emergencies:

- If the class meets (3) times per week, students are allowed (3) unexcused absences and three (3) excused absences without penalty. After the third unexcused absence, the student's grade will drop one letter per absence; after the sixth absence (excused and/or unexcused) the student is expected to drop the course to prevent an unfavorable final assessment for the class.
- If the class meets (2) times per week, students are allowed (2) unexcused absences and two (2) excused absences without penalty. After the second unexcused absence, the student's grade will drop one letter per absence; after the fifth absence (excused and/or unexcused) the student is expected to drop the course to prevent an unfavorable final grade assessment for the class.
- Students' attendance will be determined by the weekly assignments they submit. Students are required to turn in at least three assignments per week in order to satisfy the weekly attendance requirement.

Technology Prerequisites:

Method of Instruction:

This course is designed as a hybrid course where students are expected to complete assignments both on line utilizing E360 Management System (75%) AND in the physical classroom (25%); HOWEVER, the course is also designed to accommodate 100% on-line teaching and learning.

The course is approximately 75% Learner Centered and 25% Content Centered- thereby allowing students to work at self-pace to a significant degree. Although students may maneuver through the

learning modules at a swift pace, even completing all assignments well in advance of the due dates; they are not permitted to submit assignments later than the due dates (without official excuse). Failure to complete assignments on time will prevent students from engaging in other assignments (especially group assignments) that require prerequisite knowledge in order to efficiently progress.

Materials in this class will be covered in discussions, presentations, audio/video media, virtual meetings, group collaboration, and reading assignments.

Success in this Class:

To be successful in this class, students must demonstrate a minimum level mastery of 60% of the learning outcome outlined in the syllabus. Level of mastery of these skills will determine the final assessment. As the students' level of mastery increase, so will their performance evaluation grade. Students are encouraged to utilize all of the resources available to them to ensure a high level of mastery.
