1. How do you write a reference for a book with one author in-the-text and on the reference page?

In-text citations for one author in a book can require putting The author's name, and the year the book was published in parentheses followed with the summary. For the reference, it's Lastname, F. M. (date). Title in sentence case: Italicized, but not underlined. Place: Publisher. For a direct quote, you would put the quote first, and then in parentheses, you would include the author's name, year of publication, and the page number.

2. How do you write a reference for a book with three or more authors in-the-text, and on a reference page?

If its three authors, you can include their names and the year of publication, or you can consist of the primary author's name and put "et al." representing multiple authors for in-text citations. For a quotation for various authors would be in parentheses, it would include; author's name or primary author and et al., then the year of publication and the page number.

3. How do you write a reference for interviews in-the-text and on reference pages?

For in-text citations on interviews, you would first state your quote or summary. Then, in parentheses, say the interviewee's name, then follow up with "personal communication," then the date. On a reference page for the web, you would put Person-interviewed, F. M. (Year, Month Date). Interview title (F. M. Last, Interviewer). *Title of webpage*. Retrieved from <http://www.url.com>.

4. How do you write a reference for personal communications-in-the-text and on reference pages?

For in-text citations of personal communications, you would put the quote first with the person interviewed. Then you would state in parentheses "personal communications" and then the exact date this happens. You can't put personal communications on a reference page because they can't be recovered.

5. How do you write a reference for dictionaries in the text and on reference pages?

For an in-text citation, you would put in parentheses documentation and the date or "n.d." Then, for reference pages, you would include Documentation. (n.d.). In *Merriam-Webster.com dictionary*. Retrieved from <https://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/documentation>.

6. How do you write a reference for encyclopedias in the text and on reference pages?

For the in-text citation of a quote, it would be "Title of Entry," Year, p. page number or section name and paragraph number" and for a paraphrase, it would be the "title of entry" and the year. In the Title of the entry. (Year of Publication). In Editor's First Initial. Second Initial if given. Last Name (Ed.), *name of encyclopedia or dictionary* (edition if given and is not the first edition). Retrieved from Database with the Name database.

7. How do you write a reference for journals in the text and on reference pages?

For an in-text citation, you would include the author or author's name with the year and page number in parentheses after a quote. For the reference page, you would include author (year of publication), article title, *journal title*, *journal volume*, article, page range of article, and URL.

8. How do you write a reference for the internet in the text and on reference pages?

For an in-text citation, you would use the author's last name and the date of the publication. If there's no author, put the website title and date of publication. Then for the reference page, it

would be Last, F.M. (Year, Month Date Published). Article title or page title. Retrieved from
URL.
