2. Edom would be destroyed by the Lord for having failed to assist Judah, her brother, in a time of need.

Jonah

1. Nineveh
2. The capital of Assyria, and to warn the great metropolis of its impending doom.

Micah

1. Israel
2. Condemnation of idolatry, corruption of the people, craftiness of the leaders
3. King Jotham, Ahaz, Hezekiah

Nahum

1. Nineveh
2. He presents a dramatic description of the subjugation of Nineveh by a tremendous host of chariots and infantry that would completely overrun the city,
3. King Manesseh

Habakkuk

1. Babylonian
2. They were presumptuousness and there bloodiness, their drunkenness, their idolatry all will undermine them and reduce them to eventual oblivion.

Zephaniah

1. Judah

2. The judgement of Judah will be a day of wrath, of trouble and distress, of waste and desolation, of darkness and gloominess, of clouds and thick darkness, of the trumpet and alarm against the fenced cities and high towers.

Haggai

1. Jews
2. The people began to build their own residences and, under the sanction of Cyrus and Cambyses and the blessing of God, made a good start to recovery, though the undertaking staggers the imagination.
3. King Cyrus

Zechariah

1. Jews
2. The exiles had returned from Babylon to rebuild the Temple, but the work had been thwarted and stalled.
3. King Zerubbabel

Malachi

1. Jews
2. Their offering inferior animals to the Lord, the sinfulness of the priests, and their mixed marriages, but they would only reply.
