Notes from Presentation:

Value Defined

- Relative worth, merit, or importance: *the value of a college education*
- Monetary or material worth, as in commerce or trade
- Import or meaning; force; significance: *the value of a word*
- Liking or affection; favorable regard
- The ideals, customs, institutions, etc., of a society toward which the people of the group have an affective regard

Philosophies

- Animal Welfare
 - A philosophy that animals should be treated in a kind and caring manner
- Animal Rights
 - A philosophy that animals have the same rights as humans and that they should not be used for human consumption

Another Approach- Dominion

- Absolut: people can do whatever they want to animals, humans are the only species with rights
- Utilitarian: animals have rights, but human needs for food, clothing, and research outweigh those rights (2 set rules for pets and market animals)
- Abolitionist: animals have similar rights as humans

Abuse and Cruelty

- Abuse: to use wrongly or improperly, to treat in a harmful, injurious, or offensive way (training a dog to attack and fight but it not being for a service like a police dog)
- Cruelty: the state or quality or being cruel (putting the animal on the verge of death)
