Activity 4.2.2 What Am I?

Purpose

Babies, boys, girls, men, and women, you hear these terms applied to people every day, but have you thought about them all being categories of classification? Animals are also classified by age and gender. You may have heard terms such as gilt, heifer, barrow, wether, or ewe and wondered what type of animal or even what gender of animal the term meant. Wonder no more as you build your animal terminology through classification.

Materials

Per student:

- *What Am I Note Card*
- Pencil
- *Agriscience Notebook*

Procedure

Your teacher will provide you with a *What Am I Note Card* that has an animal term on each side. Follow oral instructions to sort yourself into a series of groups. When you have found your group each time, record the type of animal you represent on the note card. You will repeat this process for side two of your *What Am I Note Card*.

When your teacher asks you and your classmates to share, listen carefully and record each term in the proper location on *Activity 3.4.2 Student Worksheet*.
