



1. Agender – E. Describes a person who identifies as having no gender.
2. Ally – B. A person who supports the rights of LGBT people.
3. Asexual – F. Describes a person who experiences little or no sexual attraction to others.
4. Bisexual – O. A sexual orientation that describes a person who is emotionally and sexually attracted to people of their own gender and people of other genders.
5. Cisgender – G. A person whose gender identity and assigned sex at birth correspond.
6. Gay – H. A sexual orientation that describes a person who is emotionally and sexually attracted to people of their own gender (more commonly used to describe men).
7. Gender binary – I. The idea that there are only two genders, male and female, and that a person must strictly fit into one category or another.
8. Gender dysphoria – J. Distress experienced by some individuals whose gender identity does not correspond with their assigned sex at birth.
9. Gender fluid – K. Describes a person whose gender identity is not fixed.
10. Gender non-conforming – N. Describes a gender expression that differs from a given society's norms for males and females.
11. Intersex – Q. Group of rare conditions where the reproductive organs and genitals do not develop as expected.
12. Lesbian – R. A sexual orientation that describes a woman who is emotionally and sexually attracted to other women.
13. Pangender – S. Describes a person whose gender identity is comprised of many genders.

14. Pansexual – D. A sexual orientation that describes a person who is emotionally and sexually attracted to people regardless of gender.
15. Queer – C. An umbrella term used by some to describe people who think of their sexual orientation or gender identity as outside societal norms.
16. Questioning – M. Describes an individual who is unsure about or is exploring their own sexual orientation and/or gender identity.
17. Transgender – P. Describes a person whose gender identity and assigned sex at birth do not correspond.
18. Transsexual – A. Sometimes used in medical literature or by some transgender people to describe those who have transitioned through medical interventions.
19. Two-Spirit – L. A term that connects today's experiences of LGBT Native American and American Indian people with the traditions of their cultures.
