Psychiatric Mental Health

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I am more excited than I initially thought that I would be about this module. When I thought about coming to the “psychiatric module” before, I had feelings of fear and uncertainty. It can be kind of scary when you think about the stigmas that come along with psychiatric patients. These are ideas that all psychiatric patients are not within their right mind, they are irrational, and almost always are going to put you in harm’s way. So, with those ideas in my head, it was easy for fear and uncertainty to implant itself in my mind and make me not excited about this module. However, after having just a little introduction to psychiatric mental health I was more educated on the truth behind the stigmas. She has dealt with depression ever since, especially due life situations that have happened. I have had to “talk her down off the ledge” on some occasions, or even have had to care for her when she has used alcohol to “self-medicate”. I suppose these situations also contributed to my negative thoughts/feelings of psychiatric mental health. Aside from it being scary, it can also be extremely sad and painful to have to be a part of or witness.

My only fear or concern is being caused harm by a mental health patient. When I think about this after learning some truth behind mental health, I actually feel that this is a selfish thought. As a nurse caring for the patients is my priority. If my job is clouded by my own judgements or fears about mental health, then that creates a barrier restricting me from delivering the best patient centered care possible. I think of the fact that patients who are in an extremely poor state of mental health are the actual ones who are at great risk for harm. It is part of my duties that these patients be kept from harm and be brought to a stable state to be able to go back out into the community and function in their daily lives.

I have expectations to learn more about mental health this module. I plan to keep an open mind to everything that I encounter and learn. This could be a specialty that I come to realize that my skills might actually be most useful for. I wish to learn the complete truth behind mental illnesses that go beyond the stigmas surrounding them. Along with that, I hope to learn the best possible practices in delivering care to these mental health illnesses. It is my great desire that I have great clinical experiences that show me the range of aspects that come along with delivering care in the psychiatric mental health care setting.
