Jackson Weber: BP- 118/80 R- 14 P-100 T- 98.0 O2-99% no pain

Admitted with Generalized Tonic Clonic Seizures

Nursing Diagnosis: Ineffective airway clearance due to seizure

Introduced myself

Washed my hands

ID relatives

ID pt using two patient identifiers

Asked about allergies

Assessed pt vitals and performed a neuro check

Assessed IV site

Assessed pain using FACES

Ensured side rail padding was up and bed was in lowest position

Positioned pt in recovery position during seizure

Cleared bed of any unnecessary clutter

Reassessed pt after episode

Educated mother on what happened and Jackson's plan of care going forward

Discharge education

1. Help your child enjoy normal activities
2. Identify any potential triggers, know what to do in an emergency
3. Ask your dr about any potential restriction your child may have
4. Follow a strict med schedule
5. Make sure child has a medic alert bracelet
6. Learn CPR

S- Client experienced a 3-minute tonic clonic seizure and was admitted to the emergency department.

B- Pt is a 5-year- old Caucasian male diagnosed with tonic clonic seizures 2 years ago. In the past 15 months client hasn't seen a neurologist due to mothers work schrdule. Pt is taking oral phenobarbital to control seizures.

A- Client has left forearm with IV D5NS with 20mEq KCL @ 58mL/hr pt had a seizure about 3hrs ago, he is stable and vitals are normal. Pt is awake and lethargic.

R- Neuro checks Q2hrs continue with IV fluid and maintain seizure precautions
