As I think back upon my preceptorship, I can say I notice changes in my patient care. Having the opportunity to practice nursing skills such as blood draws, medication administration, and dressing changes. Compared to when I first started this preceptorship, I do feel more confident in my ability to provide care to patients. Interacting and conversing with patients and their family members has helped me to see just exactly what it is we do as nurses. It has also helped me put into perspective how the nursing process works, clarifying role responsibilities. Also getting the opportunity to perform sterile dressing changes some more, helping to reinforce asepsis teaching. Another skill I got to perform was minor wound care on some patients, I had my nurse there talking me through it and giving me pointers on where to improve. I really enjoyed wound care and getting to practice it with my nurse, as I got to place dressings and wrap wounds which is something I needed to practice. Lastly, I gave report a few times to the oncoming night nurse which is a skill I really needed to practice. I admit I was nervous doing it, but my nurse was there with me to fill in any gaps and prompted me with info if I didn't know what to say next.

I got to practice nursing skills which helped to reinforce what I've learned before going into the profession.
