Generic Name	Dosage with route and schedule	IVP-List diluent solution, volume, and rate of administration IVPB- List concentration and rate of administration	Patient specific therapeutic reasoning	Patient specific teaching with reasoning
Vancomycin			-Fights bacteria in the intestines -Used to treat C-Diff	1. Rapid IV can lead to flushing syndrome 2. Med will only work in intestines 3. Fever 4. C-Diff (taking more will not make it more effective)
Metoprolol			-Beta blocker that affects the heart and circulation -Used to treat Angina -For hypertension	1. Should not use if pt has serious heart problem 2. Report slow heartbeats/ light-headed feeling 3. Pt should request help out of bed in case of dizziness 4. May cause confusion
Prednisone			-Decreases inflammation and keeps immune system in check if overactive -Used to treat allergic disorders, skin conditions, arthritis, asthma	1. May cause aggression 2. Report blurred vision 3. Note I&Os due to decreased amount of urine 4. Report fast/pounding, slow heartbeat
Ondansetron			-Blocks actions of chemicals in the body that trigger nausea/ vomiting	1. Should not take med if taking apomorphine 2. Report blurred vision 3. Report trouble breathing 4. Notify at once if pt has severe constipation/ stomach pain
Levofloxacin			-Antibiotic to treat bacterial infections	1. Report achilles tendon pain 2. May cause low blood sugar 3. Get help ASAP if experiencing severe/constant pain in chest

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				4. May cause serious mood/behavior changes
