May 12th, 2021	This nurse failed to document the medication that was given to her patient in the MAR, which could've resulted in injury for the patient
May 12th, 2021	While tending to the same patient, the nurse failed to waste the unused medication the way the hospital's policy required it to be wasted, which put the pharmacy at risk according to the Texas Health and Safety Code
May 12th, 2021	The nurse admitted to stealing orphenadrine for her own mother, which could've resulted very badly for a patient to have not received the medicine that they needed and also cost the patient money for a medication that they didn't even receive
May 26th, 2021	The nurse withdrew two injections for two different patients without having received orders for the medication



UNIVERSAL COMPETENCIES

The nurse violated many safety and security measures by diverting a medication for personal use, The nurse also violated safety by giving two patients a medication that hadn't been ordered for them. The nurse made many documentation errors, she failed to document the medication that she gave. The nurse violated human caring by not taking into consideration the needs of her patients and why they were receiving the medicine that they were. The nurse violated her professional role by not being an advocate for her patient and stealing one of her patient's medications.



WAYS TO PREVENT



You could prevent these errors and violations of the universal competencies, by making sure you are up to date on all of your hospital's recent policies. Another huge aspect of preventing these occurrences would be to do exactly what you know is the right thing to do, documenting as you were taught, and remaining true to the ethics of nursing. As soon as you think you're going to act outside of being a nurse, consult with someone and talk to them about the thoughts you have. This nurse knew exactly what she did wrong when she did it.
