My mother told me at a young age she had bipolar disorder, but she never managed it with medication. She would smoke a lot of marijuana and tell me it was her medication. Growing up I had watched my mother go through episodes of depression. There were times I found my mother trying to hang herself in the closet. Other times she would take me and my siblings on a shopping spree and spend her whole check on worthless items. At the time it was fun because I was a child but as I grew up, I realized we were always homeless. My mother could never keep a job growing up and we either lived with family or in the car. It wasn't until I got older and found out what bipolar disorder really was, that I found out my mother has been suffering from unmanaged bipolar disorder. She has all the symptoms from mania to depression and extreme mood swings. I experienced second hand all the complications related to bipolar disorder such as drug and alcohol abuse, suicide attempts, legal and financial trouble. Experiencing this disorder

through my mother leave me to believe that professional medical management and therapy is crucial when trying to live life with a psychiatric mental illness. Seeing clients on restraints can sometimes make me emotional because it seems so inhumane to me. I have seen swollen hands, swollen feet, damaged skin integrity due to how long clients have been on restraints. It is really sad for clients to be restraints when they have mental problems because it is uncertain if they know why or what is going on. We as professionals know why they must be on restraints but that doesn't take away from the simple fact that it is a sad thing to see.
