Community Site: Dr. Lamothe

1. What did you observe during the day? Were there any specific procedures that were able to participate in or observe? Most of the day I was able to observe good teachings from Dr. Lamothe as he performed vaginal exams on pregnant and non-pregnant women. I didn't get to participate on any procedures other than getting vital signs on patients.

2. What was the best/most interesting part of the experience?

The most interesting thing I saw today was when the doctor stripped the membranes of a patient who was 40w3d pregnant. I had never seen that being done before and I didn't know what that was. He explained to me that it's a procedure done to try and induce labor.

3. Is a community nursing position something that you would consider working in? Why or why not?

I could see myself working here. Clinics in general, I feel like ~~they're~~ they're very organized with the way they take care of their patients and I really love that.

4. Do you feel like this community site met the needs of the population they serve? Why or why not?

yes, this community site met the needs of the population they serve. Dr. Lamothe is very good at exploring different options based on the patient's situation and based on what their preferences are. He's also very good at teaching as well as his nurse.

There was mainly teaching about birth control and how to manage painful periods. I think the patient teaching was excellent, especially because the doctor would draw pictures for the patients and explain it to the best of his ability and make sure the patient understood.
