**POST-CLINICAL REFLECTION OB Simulation Reflection - due on Thursday by 2359**

To strengthen your clinical judgment skills, reflect on your knowledge and the decisions made caring for this patient by answering the reflection questions below.

Reflection Question	Nurse Reflection
What feelings did you experience in clinical?  Why?	I experienced a little stress when the visitor of my mom took the baby from the room. Although it was a bit stressful, it was a great learning experience on safety and I now know to always be alert of who is in the room, and who can and cannot hold the baby.
What did you already know and do well as you provided patient care?	I already knew the signs of respiratory distress in an infant, and what to look for. I did well by performing a focused respiratory assessment and applying a non-rebreather on the baby.
What areas do you need to develop/improve?	I need to be a little more organized with my care plan and know what all I am going to be doing when I walk into the patients' room.
What did you learn today?	I learned that even a friend of a mom can turn out to be not the person who they say they are. It is always best and the safest option to check with the mom before letting just anyone hold her baby.
How will you apply what was learned to improve patient care?	I for now on will always enter the patient room, and verify who the visitor is and confirm with mom to make sure it is safe.

Safety/Quality: My scenario involved mom, baby and a visitor who was a "friend". This person was not very close with mom, and made it seem that he was supposed to be there. When my back was turned to talk to mom about getting consent for the Hep. B vaccine for baby, he ran off with the baby and a code pink was called. This helped me to learn that it is always best to double check and verify who every person is that enters the room and check wrist bands.</li> <li>2. Clinical Judgement: My scenario was about a baby who was in respiratory distress and had a temperature instability. I was able to use my critical thinking and notice all of the signs and symptoms pertaining to the diagnosis, draw a CBC because I knew mom was Group B + so the baby was most likely going into sepsis. would call the doctor, and express my concerns that this baby needs to go to NICU.

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
