<p>interventions</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - baseline - mag sulfate - VS, LOC, FHR, urine output/protein, DTR. monitr: serum mag sulfate, I/O * have calcium gluconate/chloride as antidote for mag tox - low stim environment - bed rest / seizure precaution <p>S/S: HA, blurred vision, HTN, oliguria, ↑ creatinine, ↑ potassium</p> <p>Severe: dyspnea, crackles, ↑↑ potaxia, pulmonary edema</p>
