Safety & Quality: (Mom & Baby)

I got to bathe a baby and it just so happened to be the baby from the delivery I watched the day prior. Talk about bringing things full circle! Amber and I did it together. We were provided with all the linen, warm water, and soap we needed. We had to work gently, yet quick and efficiently to prevent the baby from getting cold. When we were finished, we thoroughly dried him off and took his temperature to ensure he was warm enough to remove from the warmer. We put him in the cutest suit, bundled him up like a burrito, topped him with a hat, and stole about 5 minutes of baby snuggles.

Clinical Judgment: (OB SIM)

I used clinical judgement in my scenario by assessing the baby in the radiant warmer (I planned on the baby being swaddled and held by mom, so I think it counts). I needed to stay with the baby, keep it warm, and provide blow by O2 before calling the NICU per doctors orders.

Patient Centered Care: (Magnolia - Community)

For my community experience I went to Magnolia Birth Doula Services and spent the day with its founder, Emily. Emily is a doula and her services are a labor of love! After her doula experience not being until her third out of five pregnancies, and from then she has screamed from roof tops. She lives to empower women and helps give them the best birthing experience she can.

A doula by definition is a person, one typically without formal obstetric training, who is employed to provide guidance and support to a pregnant woman during labor.

Emily went over what she does specifically what sets her apart as a magnolia. One of those is the individualized birth plans she creates with each of her clients. It is so detailed and gives Emily and her team of Magnolias the important details that each woman desires during their labor/birthing process. I'm talking so detailed and attentive like playlists of songs, essential oil smells, lighting preferences, she even carries battery operated candles and twinkle lights.

Everything Emily does for her mommas is done with love, care, and precision. She is highly educated and passionate when it comes to her mommas receiving the best support possible!

Professionalism: (OB SIM)

I used professionalism in my scenario by keeping my composure when the mom hemorrhaged during our assessment/treatment of the baby. There was a family in the room and she was extremely concerned so we had to explain quickly but calmly what was happening, while providing immediate hemorrhage care for the mom. I think Amber and I work quickly and efficiently while keeping mom and family informed, keeping an eye out for the baby in the warmer in the corner. It was fun to throw a twist in the scenario!

Communication & Collaboration: (Labor & Delivery)

The delivery process was very smooth, everyone had a job to do and they did it well. I got to witness the delivering doctor deliver the baby and perform her rapid assessment which all went very fast. The baby's pediatrician arrived shortly after birth and I got to watch her assessment of the baby. I also got to watch the assessment of the nursery nurse! Everyone kept the family informed and educated about everything that they were doing and the rights they had. I also was lucky and watched an epidural placement. The communication the anesthesiologist had with the nurse and patient was effective.
