Reflection Question	Nurse Reflection
What feelings did you experience in clinical? Why?	I experienced feelings of anger when confronted by the aggressive husband/dad. I believe I felt this way because he was being really aggressive and threatening and I have not really been exposed to people who behave this way.
What did you already know and do well as you provided patient care?	I already knew the patient had GBS and needed medication to treat it to prevent transmission to baby during delivery. I administered the antibiotics for GBS. Also administration of IUR because of late decelerations which resulted in a successfully vaginal delivery of baby.
What areas do you need to develop/improve?	I need to develop and improve my communication skills in dealing with aggressive or possible abusive patients or family members.
What did you learn today?	I learned that I cannot be focused on only one part of a patient's care, I need to care for the patient holistically and in addition be prepared for anything. I want to learn to broaden my critical thinking as a nurse.
How will you apply what was learned to improve patient care?	I learned that I cannot go in to care for a patient on based on what is written on paper, I need to care for patient holistically and be an advocate for my patient in all areas.
