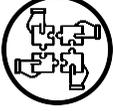

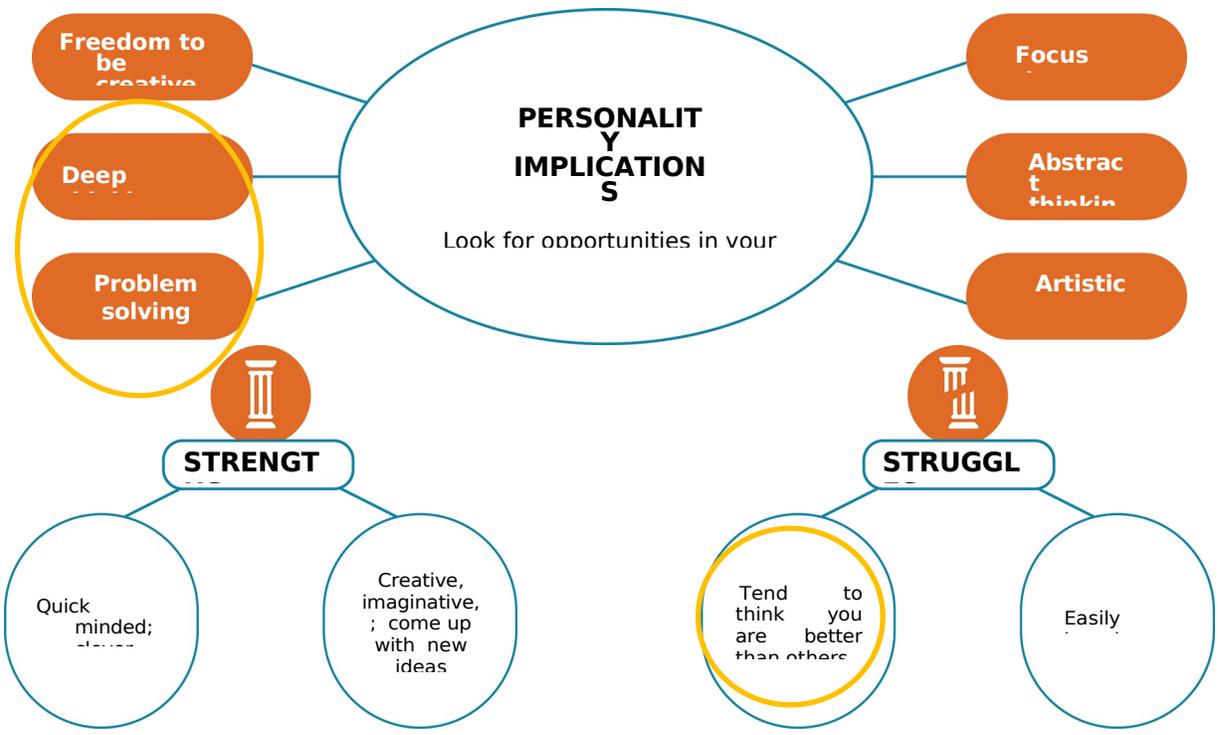
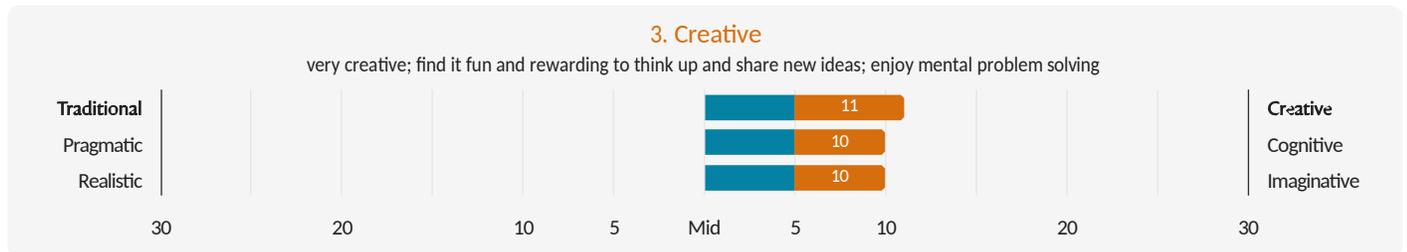
3 Your CREATIVE Personality Trait and Subtraits

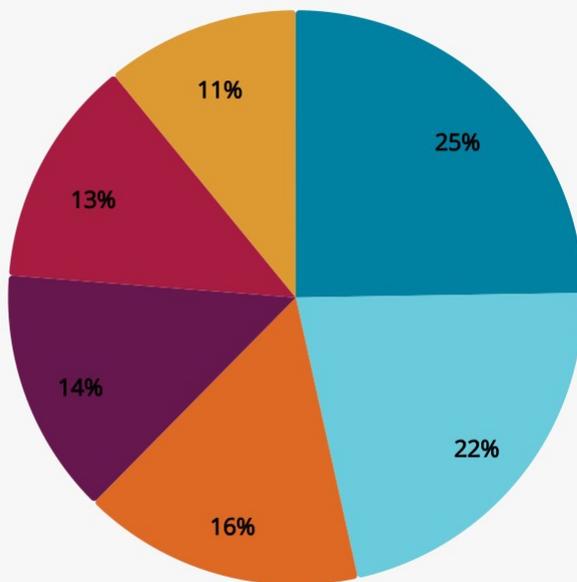

Part 3: Skills and Abilities

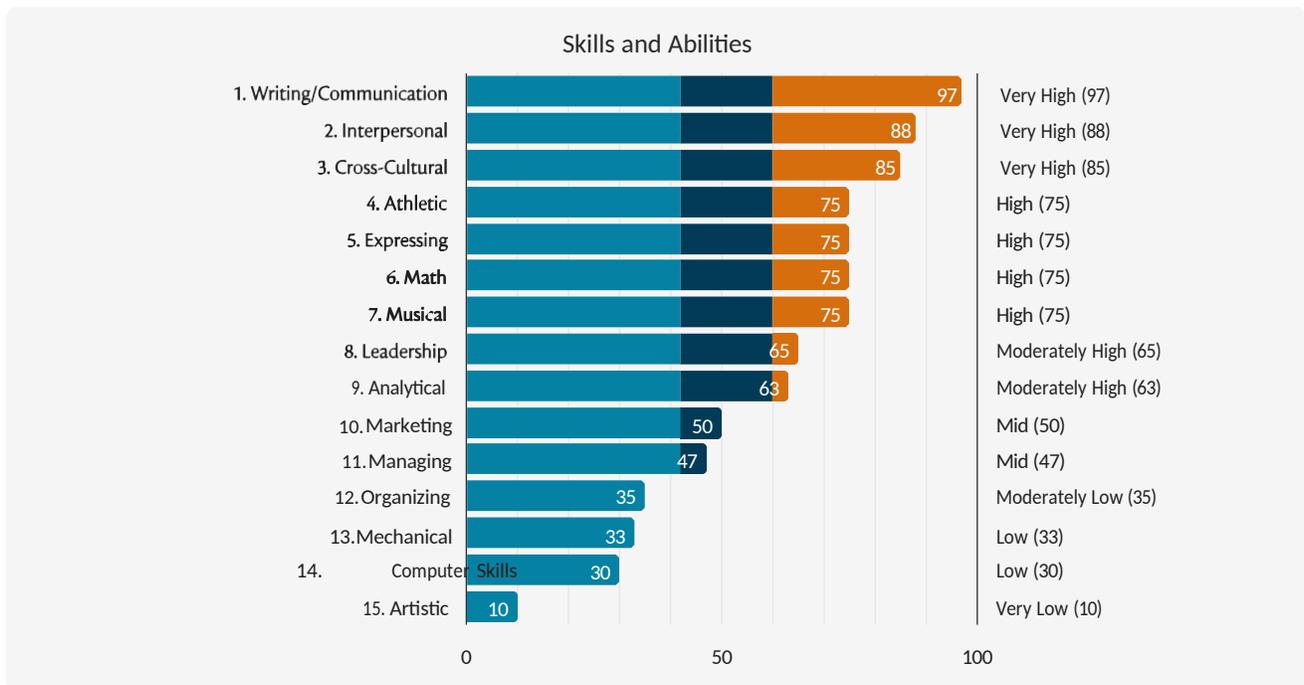
Byron, an understanding of your skills will be important as you decide where to invest your time and energy

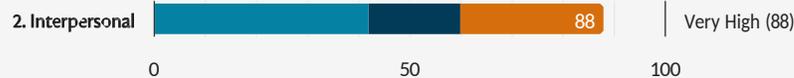
Develop Your Skills and Abilities
