Drug	Symptoms of Use	Symptoms of Intoxication	Symptoms of Withdrawal
<p>CNS Depressants</p> <p>Examples: Alcohol, barbiturates and nonbarbiturates</p>	Relaxation, loss of inhibitions, lack of concentration, drowsiness, slurred speech, sleep	Disinhibition of sexual or aggressive impulses, mood lability, impaired judgment, impaired social or occupational functioning, slurred speech, incoordination, unsteady gait, nystagmus, and flushed face	Tremor of hands, tongue, or eyelids; nausea or vomiting; malaise or weakness; tachycardia; sweating; elevated blood pressure; anxiety; depressed mood or irritability; transient hallucinations or illusions; headache; and insomnia.
<p>CNS Stimulants</p> <p>Examples: Amphetamines, Synthetic stimulants, Nonamphetamine stimulants, Cocaine, Caffeine, Nicotine</p>	Tremor, restlessness, anorexia, insomnia, agitation, and increased motor activity.	Euphoria or affective blunting; changes in sociability; hypervigilance; interpersonal sensitivity; anxiety, tension, or anger; stereotyped behaviors; or impaired judgment.	Fatigue, cramps, depression, headaches, and nightmares.
<p>Opioids</p> <p>Examples: Oxycodone, Herion, Codeine, Fetanyl, Methadone</p>	Sedation, chronic constipation, decreased respiratory rate, and pinpoint pupils	Pupillary constriction (or dilation due to anoxia from severe overdose), drowsiness, slurred speech, and impairment in attention or memory	Dysphoric mood, nausea or vomiting, muscle aches, lacrimation or rhinorrhea, pupillary dilation, piloerection, sweating, diarrhea, yawning, fever, and insomnia
<p>Hallucinogens</p>	Nausea and vomiting, Chills, Pupil dilation, Increased pulse, blood	Vertical or horizontal nystagmus, hypertension,	Panic attacks, hallucinations, severe hyperthermia, dehydration, and seizures.

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Examples: Ketamine, Phencyclidine, Lysergic acid diethylamide (LSD), Ecstasy	pressure, and temperature, Mild dizziness, Trembling, Loss of appetite, Insomnia, Sweating, Slowing of respirations, Elevation in blood sugar	tachycardia, ataxia, diminished pain sensation, muscle rigidity, and seizures	Death can occur from kidney or cardiovascular failure.
Cannabinols Examples: Marijuana, NPS (new psychoactive substances) powders or liquids to be inhaled	Euphoria, relaxed inhibitions, disorientation, depersonalization, and relaxation.	Impaired motor coordination, euphoria, anxiety, a sensation of slowed time, impaired judgment and memory, and social withdrawal.	Irritability, anger, or aggression, Nervousness, restlessness, or anxiety, Sleep difficulty (insomnia, disturbing dreams), Decreased appetite or weight loss, Depressed moods, abdominal pain, tremors, sweating, fever, chills, or headache
Inhalants Examples: Gasoline, varnish remover, lighter fluid, airplane glue, rubber cement, cleaning fluid, spray paint, shoe conditioner, and typewriter correction fluid.	Rapid excitation followed by drowsiness, incoordination, and disinhibition.	Dizziness, ataxia, Euphoria, excitation, Nystagmus, blurred vision, double vision, Slurred speech, Hypoactive reflexes, Psychomotor retardation, lethargy, Generalized muscle weakness, Stupor or coma (at higher doses)	Restlessness, nausea and vomiting, runny nose and watery eyes, poor attention and concentration, and mood changes.
