Baby boomers have a multitude of family responsibilities frequently spanning three generations. Nurses from this group are very ambitious and they put in long hours. Generation X are hard workers but they have little loyalty in leaders or institutions and they are energetic. They value the importance of their career and they tend to change jobs frequently. Technology has initiated an expectation of immediate response and satisfaction; they want immediate answers from a variety of sources. They want extensive learning and precepting, and they want their questions answered immediately. Generation Y are those in their 30s and 40s. They are influencing how organizations are influenced. They are smart and believe education is the key to success. Diversity is a given for this group and technology is as transparent as air. They are optimistic and interactive yet they value individuality and uniqueness. They can multitask, think fast, and are extremely creative. Generation Y nurses are not team players but they are the most educated generation ever and they tend to change jobs frequently. This is because they seek growth and expansion. Generation Z have never lived without the internet or other forms of communication.

1. What is TeamSTEPPS?

TeamSTEPPS are steps to enhance performance and patient safety.

2. What are the key skills of TeamSTEPPS? Briefly explain each.

Communication which is a verbal and nonverbal process by which information can be clearly and accurately exchanged among team members. Team leadership is the ability to lead teams to maximize the effectiveness of team members by ensuring that team actions are understood, changes in information are shared, and team members have the necessary resources.

Situational monitoring which is the process of actively scanning and assessing situational elements to gain information or understanding, or to maintain awareness to support team functioning. Mutual support is the ability to anticipate and support team members' needs through accurate knowledge about their responsibilities and workload.

3. What are the responsibilities of an effective team leader?

The responsibilities of an effective team leader are communicating, coordinating, and collaborating to provide optimal care. Sometimes teams are formally defined and permanent. Other times teams are rapidly created to respond to an emerging need. Patients and family caregivers are always part of the team.
