Identify Complete and Objective Anecdotes

Review the format for writing objective anecdotes:

- Focus on what the child did and said.
- Be factual.
- Be specific.
- Be brief.

Week 1: Writing Anecdotes and Introducing the COR Advantage Categories (continued)

Read through each anecdote carefully. Decide if it is both complete and objective. If it meets the criteria for a complete and objective anecdote, select “Thumbs up” as your answer. If you don’t think it meets the criteria for a complete and objective anecdote, select “Thumbs down” as your answer.

This assignment is worth 10 points (1 per question).

Try It Out

Write Three Anecdotes

Write three anecdotes about children in your class. You can write three anecdotes on the same child or write an anecdote for three different children. Use the correct format for writing anecdotes. Make sure that your anecdotes are objective.

Your assignment has two parts:

- Select the following age range that most closely fits your anecdotes (Infant-Toddler, Preschool, or Kindergarten) and put it at the top of your post. Put your three anecdotes in one post, numbering them 1, 2, and 3. **This post is worth 10 points and is due Thursday.**
- Next, reply to two posts from other participants and provide feedback about their anecdotes to each of them. Please be specific — what was useful or confusing about the anecdote? Both of your replies are **worth 5 points each and are due the following Monday.**

Reminder: You are responsible for a total of 3 posts: 1 initial post (containing three anecdotes) due by Thursday and 2 separate replies due by the following Monday.

Share What You Learned

Your Thoughts About COR Advantage Categories

You have now been introduced to COR Advantage categories through your reading assignment. Share your thoughts by responding to one of the following questions:

1. How will these categories correspond with the work you do with your children?
2. What category are you most excited about? Why?
3. What category do you feel least familiar? Why?

Your assignment has two parts:

- In the Discussion tab under “Week 1 — Share What You Learned,” post your response. Put the number of the question you are answering at the top of your post. **This post is worth 10 points and is due on Thursday.**



Week 1: Writing Anecdotes and Introducing the COR Advantage Categories (continued)

- Next, reply to one other person's post. Be sure to reply to someone who answered a different question than you did. Your reply is **worth 5 points and is due the following Monday**.

Remember, your reply should further the thinking and discussion on this topic. Replies are most useful when you are building on an idea shared. You might share your perspective on the issue, add to the examples given, state why you agree or disagree, etc. Replies that just say "I agree," "Good idea," or "Me too" don't really add anything to the discussion, and you will not get credit for these types of replies.

Check back later in the week to see what has been posted, and scroll down to read recent entries.

Total points possible in Week 1 = 45.



Reminder: You are responsible for a total of 2 posts: 1 initial post due by Thursday and 1 reply due by the following Monday.

 - Scout — Item M: Listening and comprehension
- You may practice scoring as many times as needed.

 - Bing — Item U: Measurement
 - Jayla — Item CC: Experimenting, predicting, and drawing conclusions
- You may practice scoring as many times as needed.

Your assignment has two parts:

- Using the children in your class, write three separate anecdotes and identify the corresponding COR Advantage item for each (choose only from items S–JJ). These three posts are **worth 10 points each and are due on Thursday**.

Use the fillable document on page 3 of the Try It Out assignment to record your responses and upload them to the Dropbox. This assignment is worth a total of 20 points: 1 point for identifying the COR Advantage item and 2 points for each idea for filling in the gap. Refer to Week 4 Learning Unit for examples of filling in the gaps. This assignment is **worth 20 points and is due Monday.**
