RN Assessment	4	100.0%	The assessment step of the nursing process involves application of nursing knowledge to the collection, organization, validation and documentation of data about a client's health status. The nurse focuses on the client's response to a specific health problem including the client's health beliefs and practices. The nurse thinks critically to perform a comprehensive assessment of subjective and objective information. Nurses must have excellent communication and assessment skills in order to plan client care.

The nurse uses a client's assessment data and nursing diagnoses to develop measurable client goals/outcomes and identify nursing interventions. The nurse uses evidenced based practice to set client goals, establish priorities of care, and identify nursing interventions to assist the client to achieve his goals.
