Rationale: RKC Ch 17 p 601 When the umbilical cord is clamped, the first breath is taken and the lungs begin to function, a resulting systemic vascular resistance increases and blood return to the heart via the inferior vena cava decreases. Concurrently with these changes, there is a rapid decrease in pulmonary vascular resistance and an increase in pulmonary blood flow. The foramen ovale functionally closes with a decrease in pulmonary vascular resistance, which leads to a decrease in right-sided heart pressures. An increase in systemic pressure, after clamping of the cord, leads to an increase in left-sided heart pressures. It is this increase in left atrial pressure that causes the foramen ovale to close, thus allowing the output from the right ventricle to flow entirely to the lungs.

Before birth, the foramen ovale allowed most of the oxygenated blood entering the right atrium from the inferior vena cava to pass into the left atrium of the heart. With the newborn's first breath, air pulses into the lungs, triggering an increase in pulmonary blood flow and pulmonary venous return to the left atrium becomes higher than in the right atrium. The increased left atrial pressure causes the foramen ovale to close, thus allowing the output from the right ventricle to flow entirely to the lungs. With closure of this fetal shunt, oxygenated blood is now separated from unoxygenated blood. The subsequent increase in tissue oxygenation further promotes the increase in systemic blood pressure and continuing blood flow to the lungs. The foramen ovale normally closes functionally at birth when left atrial pressure increases and right atrial pressure decreases. Permanent anatomic closure, though, really occurs throughout the next several weeks. (Ricci, Kyle, & Carman, 2021)

The external genitalia in the preterm baby girl appear large with widely spaced labia, and not closely approximated. Vernix is scant in postterm newborns and is excessive in premature infants. Blood vessels are more prominent due to increased transparency of the skin.
