

Community Assessment Presentation

Due: _____

PURPOSE: Assess a selected community to determine the needs, resources, and the general health of the community.

Knowledge: Integrate understanding of multiple dimensions of patient centered care: patient/family/community preferences, and values. Also, to encourage knowledge of local community resources.

Skills: Seek information about outcomes of care for populations served in care setting

TASKS:

- Meet with your clinical group. Divide out the assignment. Determine which student will interview which local stakeholder (see the N442: Windshield Survey Verification Form).
- Please do not procrastinate on this project as it can be time consuming as you must travel to take photographs and arrange phone interviews or personal interviews with the personnel and other agencies outlined as well as community members.
- This presentation is in PowerPoint format and is group work (assigned by group).
- This will be presented on the date determined in the weekly lesson plans and syllabus.
- Each clinical group member must be included in multiple photos a minimum of 3 pictures, including 1 group photo.
- Perform a windshield survey on the clinical day assigned – this can be individually or as a group.
- Ask the stakeholder interviews the following questions:
