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Course Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs):

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- Evaluate the nursing process to provide care throughout the normal process of childbearing.
- Demonstrate safe, quality care of patients with common perinatal and newborn complications.
- Coordinate with the healthcare team to plan care and provide health promotion education for the dyad.
- Demonstrate teaching principles in the promotion of family health and developmental needs during the childbearing cycle.
- Assess cultural differences and patient preferences into the care of the dyad.

Course Requirements:

- Exams, skills, & test-taking:
 1. Students must have a readily available computer and Internet provider to complete requirements of this course.
 2. Students must achieve a minimum cumulative course average of at least 77%.
 3. A cumulative exam average of 77% must be achieved before any other course work will be calculated into the final grade.
 4. Students arriving late on test dates should not enter the class if students are testing. This will distract the test-taking students. The student may enter the classroom after all students have completed their exams. Students who are late for exams unexpectedly or who do not attend class on the day of an exam without prior approval of the instructor, unless medical documentation is provided to excuse the student, are subject to the following unexcused exam policy:
 - a. First occurrence: The student will be given an unexcused absence / tardy and will need to reschedule the test with the instructor. The student must schedule the makeup exam within 24 hours of the unexcused absence / missed exam. It is the student's responsibility

to reach out to the instructor to reschedule their exam. Failure on the student's part to reach out to the instructor within 24 hours of the unexcused absence / missed exam will result in a zero. Students who miss exams may receive a different and more difficult exam than their peers.

- b. Second occurrence: An academic improvement plan will be issued. The student will be given an unexcused absence / tardy and will need to reschedule the test with the instructor. The student must schedule the makeup exam within 24 hours of the unexcused absence / missed exam. It is the student's responsibility to reach out to the instructor to reschedule their exam. Failure on the student's part to reach out to the instructor within 24 hours of the unexcused absence / missed exam will result in a zero. Students who miss exams may receive a different and more difficult exam than their peers.
 - c. Third occurrence: The student will be given an unexcused absence. The student will not be permitted to take the exam. A zero will be issued for the exam and any further exams that the student has an unexcused absence / tardiness for.
5. Students who are absent on an exam day must notify the instructor *before* the scheduled exam time. Documentation for reasoning of absence must be provided prior to the student being permitted to make-up the exam. If a student fails to provide sufficient documentation, makeup is at the discretion of the course coordinator. The course coordinator reserves the right to administer an alternative version of the exam to protect exam integrity.
 6. Students will take all class exams in the classroom with their own computer device unless otherwise instructed by the course instructor.
 7. Students are not permitted to leave the classroom during exams and re-enter to continue testing.
 8. Students will quietly leave the classroom after testing and will not be allowed to re-enter until after all students have completed testing to avoid distraction.
 9. Students are not permitted to ask questions during an exam on exam content.
 10. Students will not challenge exam scores or discuss exam questions in class. If the student wishes to discuss the exam the student is responsible for requesting an appointment with the instructor.
 11. Review of missed exam questions will require an appointment with the course instructor and should be completed prior to the next scheduled exam.
 12. Remediation for failed exams will be outlined in the academic improvement plan (AIP).

- **Coursework:**

1. Students must turn in all assignments on time. **No late work will be accepted. Any work turned in after a due date will result in a score of zero.**
2. Course content reading assignments should be done *prior* to coming to the classroom setting so the student can actively participate in discussion and bring questions to class.
3. All students must be present for the group presentations in order to receive a grade in that category on the rubric. Those not present can receive a grade of zero for the project (at the discretion of the course coordinator).

4. For all the ATI assignments the learner must achieve at least a 77% to receive credit. This may be done more than once to raise your score.
 5. ATI submission criteria is listed below. Downloading the PDF report is the easiest way to ensure all required information is included. Note: if a student submits a file that does not include all required criteria, the student will receive a zero.
 6. ATI Submission Criteria:
 - Name of student
 - Date of completion (MUST be within current semester)
 - Name of assignment
 - Proof of post-test score(s) must be visible. The visible highest post-test score will be used
 7. All assignments submitted will be named in the following fashion: Your Last name _ Assignment name.
- Behavior:
 1. Anything that interrupts student learning is considered disruptive. If you are asked to leave the classroom or clinical due to disruptive behavior, it will be considered an unexcused absence.
 2. Students are expected to have cell phones silenced and off the vibration mode. Students should not use their cell phones or other technology during class time unless it is related to the class content and directed to do so by the instructor.
 3. Students will display behavior in accordance to the mission and vision of the college.
 4. Students will not write emails or converse with the instructor or peers in a disrespectful manner.
 5. Side conversations during class time are prohibited due to disruption of the learning environment for all students.
 - General:
 1. Students are required to be familiar with the medical terminology in the required textbooks and clinical settings. Use the dictionary and medical terminology text frequently.
 2. Students are expected to check their Lakeview email on a daily basis for communication from instructors.
 - Clinical course requirements:
 1. A grading rubric will be supplied to the student for each clinical assignment, and the student will be held responsible for completing the assignment according to the rubric.
 2. The instructor may review the assignment and return the assignment for resubmission if the score is not 77% or greater or if the student does not follow previous constructive comments given from the instructor on previous care plan or concept map assignments.
 3. All clinical assignments will be submitted in Microsoft Word Document format.
 4. All clinical assignments submitted in PDF, Google Doc, etc. format will not be accepted, and the student will receive a score of zero (0) on that assignment.
 5. ***Care Plan & Concept Map Assignment:** Two care plan assignments and one concept map are required. The care plans and concept map must be done on client assignments of the same week. The care plans and concept map are due 5 days after the clinical day on which it is assigned by 2359 i.e., Monday clinical the care plan is due by 2359 on Saturday. Care plans or concept maps turned in after the 5 days will receive a score of 0% and thus be a failure of this clinical assignment.

6. The culture report is a required clinical assignment. A properly written APA formatted paper must be submitted to the drop box by the date assigned in the Syllabus and then be presented orally during clinical after that date. The culture report will be reviewed by the clinical instructor and a grade of **77%** or better must be achieved. If the culture report is not turned in on time or does not achieve at grade of 77% or better, it will be considered a failure of this clinical assignment.
7. The teaching project is a required clinical assignment. It is to be presented during clinical as assigned in the syllabus.
8. The instructor will review each clinical assignment and return it with comments. If the score is not 77% or greater, the student must complete another assignment **on a different client than the initial care plan or concept map, a different culture, or different teaching topic**. A resubmission of an assignment must be submitted 5 days after assigned and NO late assignments will be accepted. The student must achieve a score of 77% or greater on the resubmission. **Only one of the 5 clinical assignments can be resubmitted. A second failure of any of the 5 clinical assignments or the resubmission will result in a clinical failure and subsequently a course failure.**

- **Theory Attendance Policy**
If the student does not attend scheduled class(es) during the semester, their ability to complete the course will be evaluated.
- **Clinical Attendance Policy**
 1. In order to ensure continuity of patient care, a student must notify the course coordinator and clinical faculty of an absence prior to the start of a clinical experience. Failure to notify the course coordinator and clinical faculty of an absence in advance of the clinical experience will be documented and the student will receive an unexcused absence. Clinical instructors will notify course coordinators of absences the same day the student misses clinical.
 2. If a student is late for a clinical, that student will be dismissed from clinical for that day and it will be counted as an unexcused absence. The clinical time must be made up in the lab within two weeks of the missed clinical day.
 3. In order to maintain patient safety, the faculty may dismiss the student from the clinical area with instructions to remedy the problem if the student is not prepared for the clinical experience. Such dismissal will be documented as an unexcused absence. Clinical absences will be documented and the clinical time must be made up in the lab within two week(s) of the missed clinical day.
 3. Clinical absences will be documented, and the student will be held accountable to make up the clinical hours missed to meet the required clinical course hours. Clinical absences must be made up within 2 (two) weeks of the missed clinical.

4. Hospital-based clinical hours missed will be made up on a 2:1-hour basis either by onsite or virtual simulation, demonstrating skills in lab, or a combination of both as determined by the course coordinator and clinical instructor.
5. Non-hospital based clinical hours may be made up as determined by the course coordinator. The course coordinator will notify the lab coordinator. Students are expected to meet all required clinical objectives to achieve a “pass” for clinical.
4. Unexcused absences can typically be planned for. A few examples of unexcused absences are vacations, family celebrations such as weddings or birthdays or too many assignments.
5. *If a student has two [2] unexcused clinical absences, they will fail clinical for that course.*
6. An excused absence is typically due to circumstances beyond a student’s control. Some examples are illness, death in the family, auto accident or an approved religious holiday.

How to Decide if you are Too Sick to Attend Clinical:

Fever > 100.4

Conjunctivitis (Pink Eye)

Diarrhea - lasting more than 12 hours

Group A Strep culture confirmed or physician diagnosed

Jaundice - yellowing of the skin, which might suggest viral hepatitis

Cold sores (herpes)

Active measles, mumps, pertussis, rubella or chicken pox

Upper respiratory infection (cold)

Tuberculosis and/or positive TB skin test

Shingles (chicken pox) or any rash of unknown origin

Head lice

Scabies (mites that burrow under the skin causing a rash)

Any draining wound such as an abscess or boil

Impetigo (type of skin infection)

Mononucleosis

COVID-19 Symptoms

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea
