Nursing Philosophy

The nursing metaparadigm is “a recognizable pattern or model that provides a foundation for a particular discipline used as an overarching framework to describe key organizing concepts related to the field” (Hood, 2022). The metaparadigm of nursing provides a holistic approach to patient care. It provides the foundation for applying essential skills nurses must possess. It allows nurses to have a comprehensive look at the patient’s health and well-being and allows the nurse to meet their patient’s physical, social, and emotional needs. The nursing metaparadigm is broken down into four concepts. The four concepts include human beings, environment, health, and nursing (Hood, 2022). These concepts provide a comprehensive description of the importance of nurses and caring for patients, which allows the nursing profession to be unified (Hood, 2022).

The first concept of the nursing metaparadigm is the human being concept. The human being concept is defined as “recipients of nursing care” (Hood, 2022). This concept considers one’s spiritual, social, and emotional needs (Deliktas et al., 2019). The goal of the human being concept is for the patient to manage their well-being and health (Deliktas et al., 2019). Nurses participate by ensuring the patient understands the importance of maintaining personal connections. Allowing the patient to voice their emotional needs and what they are going through can help meet their personal connections. The second concept of the nursing metaparadigm is the environment concept. The environment concept includes the importance of physical and social environments (Hood, 2022). A patient’s surroundings can have an impact on their health and well-being. A person’s physical environment should include a well-lit room that’s warm, clean, and comfortable, as it can heal a person’s well-being (Deliktas et al., 2019). The person should also have a trustworthy and safe social environment. Nurses are a part of a

patient's social environment, and nurses can positively impact a patient (Deliktas et al., 2019). Not only do nurses affect patients, but patients impact nurses as well. A safe, comforting, and positive environment can establish trust and connection between the nurse and the patient (Deliktas et al., 2019). The third concept of the nursing metaparadigm is the health concept. The health concept is defined as a "person or state" (Hood, 2022). Health is viewed throughout the patient's lifetime as it can fluctuate and affect the patient in many different ways. Health and illness affect the patient's well-being, mind, body, and soul (Deliktas et al., 2019). Nurses must consider the patient's well-being, chronic illnesses, genetic makeup, and disorders that can affect the patient before treating the patient (Deliktas et al., 2019). The patient must be in tune with their physical, mental, and social needs as it can affect their health positively or negatively. The fourth concept of the metaparadigm is nursing. Nursing in the metaparadigm includes nurses' roles, goals, and functions (Hood, 2022). In the nursing concept, it takes everything that nurses have learned from school, and in the nursing field to combine what they learned and uses nursing skills to carry out the responsibility nurses have when providing patient care (Deliktas et al., 2019). Nurses must show compassion and empathy when caring for patients. Nurses must also show love to themselves and take care of themselves to properly care for another person (Deliktas et al., 2019). Nurses must follow a professional practice to maintain mutual respect between the nurse, the patient, and the patient's family to provide a good quality of care (Deliktas et al., 2019). The nursing metaparadigm is essential for practicing and providing safe care to patients and ensuring the nurse is aware and in tune with their feelings and emotions to help them serve the best care possible.
