Rationale	Using clarity, which is saying exactly what you mean, and brevity, which is using the fewest words necessary, support interprofessional and client communication by providing a message that is simple, direct, and focuses on priority information.	
Character	Joe Rogers	
Selected Option/ Result	"Can you tell me what Dr. Deane said to you?"	Result: Correct
Rationale	Focused questions are a therapeutic communication technique because they allow the nurse to clarify a message, collect data, encourage feedback, and confirm the client's ideas and beliefs.
