Types of Communication

- There are verbal and nonverbal types of communication. Verbal is word choice and meaning. It can be used in such ways as pace, recognizing vocal intonation, and clarity and brevity.

Priority setting

- Foundational Thinking is the ability to recall and comprehend information and concepts foundational to quality nursing practice.
- Comprehending Information is understanding the knowledge retrieved, verbalize or use it in some manner, understanding is another term used for comprehension.
- Using foundational thinking is recalling information, demonstrating comprehension, and applying it to a clinical situation.
