Factors of hospitals associated with an independent hospice care unit

This journal article talks about how hospice is provided in hospital settings in countries like South Korea. The United States offers hospice services in a variety of settings including in the patient's own home and so this study shows how hospice in a hospital setting is different. One of the hypotheses for this study that was done was that hospitals more often offer hospice services when they have a high number of terminally ill patients that are seen at that hospital. Whether hospice care is done in a hospital or other setting was what prompted this research study.

Assumptions

The authors are concerned with figuring out why hospitals do or don't decide to correlate hospice units within their facilities. Thinking that one of the correlations about high-risk disease patients in a hospital and the likelihood of having a hospice unit because of aspects such as these is great thinking. The data collected offered knowledge to the authors to correlate their hypothesis with actual data that proved their correlations were correct.

Deficit/Conclusion

I accept the author's thinking in this study. I agree that certain correlations can be made about the reason hospitals choose to have a hospice unit or not. From the data gathered, the hypothesis was proven to be true about things like more cancer patients being a reason for a

hospital to have a hospice unit at the facility. Nursing can benefit from the knowledge found in this study because nurses are a huge part of hospice care. The vast majority of the care that hospice patients receive is directly from the nurse. If nurses can figure out the correlations between hospitals having hospice units and the reasons, they can help to advocate for patients to be able to receive these services in their facilities. Advocating for our patients is one of the most important aspects of being a nurse.
