<b>SAMPLE Subcategory: Case Management</b>
<b>SAMPLE Topic: Anemias: Discharge Teaching for a Client Who is Recovering from Sickle Cell Crisis</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• SAMPLE Critical Point #1: Anemia is the abnormally low amount of circulation RB, Hgb concentration, or both.</li><li>• SAMPLE Critical Point #2: When a patient is going through sickle crisis, the nurse should monitor oxygen saturation to determine a need for oxygen therapy.</li><li>• SAMPLE Critical Point #3: A patient should have their hemoglobin checking in 4 to 6 weeks to determine efficacy.</li></ul>

**Main Category: Health Promotion and Maintenance**

**Subcategory: Health Screening**

**Topic: Thorax, Heart, and Abdomen: Steps for Performing an Abdominal Assessment**

- Techniques include inspection, auscultation, palpation, and percussion.
- Need a stethoscope, tape measure, and marking pen.
- Divide the abdomen into four quadrants: right upper quadrant, left upper quadrant, right lower quadrant, left lower quadrant.

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**Subcategory: Health Promotion/Disease Prevention**

**Topic: Health Promotion and Disease Prevention: Preventing Colorectal Cancer**

- Get a fecal occult blood test every year between the ages of 45-75
- Flexible sigmoidoscopy every five years
- Colonoscopy every ten years

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**Subcategory: High-Risk Behaviors**

**Topic: Older Adults (65 years and Older): Reducing the Risk for Osteoporosis**

- Increase calcium, vitamin D, protein, and leafy greens
- Avoid smoking and limit alcohol
- Exercise regularly with weight bearing exercises like walking, dancing, and tennis

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**Main Category: Health Promotion and Maintenance**

**Subcategory: Techniques of Physical Assessment**

**Topic: Head and Neck: Expected Eye Assessment Findings**

- EOM present bilaterally
- White sclera, clear cornea
- No drainage

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### **Subcategory: Elimination**

**Topic: Urinary Elimination: Interventions to Promote Voiding in a Client Who Is Postoperative**

- Anesthesia and opioid analgesics decrease urine output
- Closely monitor I&O
- Encourage patient to drink fluids

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### **Subcategory: Nutrition and Oral Hydration**

**Topic: Assisting a Client Who Has Dysphagia**

- Encourage patients to swallow twice
- Give pureed foods and thickened liquids
- Place the patient in a safe position (high fowlers)

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## **Main Category: Psychosocial Integrity**

### **Subcategory: End-of-Life Care**

**Topic: Grief, Loss, and Palliative Care: Identifying a Family Who Is Experiencing a Maturational Loss**

- Any loss normally expected due to the developmental processes of life

- Associated with normal life transitions, help develop coping skills
- A child leaving for college

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### **Subcategory: Mobility and Immobility**

**Topic: Teaching a Client About Logrolling While in Bed**

- Prevents back pain and injury
- Allow the patient to take their time
- Tell the patient to tighten their abdominal muscles to avoid hurting their back

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### **Subcategory: Potential for Complications of Diagnostic Tests/Treatments/Procedures**

**Topic: Fluid Imbalances: Monitoring Labs Postoperatively**

- Rapid or severe hydration can induce seizures
- Increased proteins, electrolytes, and glucose
- Excessive vomiting, nasogastric suctioning, and diarrhea can cause dehydration

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**Subcategory: System-Specific Assessments**

**Topic: Head and Neck: Expected Findings With Cranial Nerve Assessment**

- Eyes parallel to each other without bulging
- No edema or redness in the area of the lacrimal glands
- Corneas clear, shiny, and smooth

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**Subcategory: Therapeutic Procedures**

**Topic: Bowel Elimination: Discharge Teaching About Ostomy Care**

- Ostomy site should be pink with good blood flow
- The site will be sensitive at first but the surrounding skin should not be irritated
- Change ostomy bag when it is manageably full (2/3)

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**Subcategory: Fluid and Electrolyte Imbalances**

**Topic: Fluid and Electrolyte Imbalances: Expected Findings for a Client Who Has Hypocalcemia**

- Muscle twitches
- Weak, thready pulse
- Hyperactive bowel sounds

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**Subcategory: Pathophysiology**

**Topic: Adverse Effects, Interactions, and Contraindications: Assessing for an Allergic Reaction to Antibiotics**

- Dizziness
- Hives
- Severe itching or swelling

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**Subcategory: Analyze Cues**

**Topic: Urinary Elimination: Caring for a Client Who Has an Ileostomy**

- Avoid heavy lifting for three months after procedure
- Avoid using skin products that contain alcohol at the ileostomy site
- Alert the provider if the site looks, swollen, red, or shows other signs of infection

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**Subcategory: Prioritize Hypotheses**

**Topic: Mobility and Immobility: Priority Risk for a Client Who Has Impaired Mobility**

- The risk of complication increases with the level of immobility
- Alterations in balance cause a major increase in risk for falls or injuries
- Huge increase in risk for infection and skin breakdown

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**Subcategory: Take Actions**

**Topic: Urinary Elimination: Reviewing the Medical Record of a Client Who Has a Urinary Tract Infection**

- A urine culture is the gold standard for identifying a UTI
- Check if the patient is reporting fever, lethargy, or urgency and frequency
- Urine culture will be positive for leukocytes

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
