

1) Name of character: Moses

Type of migrant: Refugees

For Moses' first forty years, he spent it in the Egyptian palace, "learned all the knowledge of the Egyptians, and has the ability to speak and act." (Acts 7:22) At that time, he was really complacent and full of enthusiasm. We must save our fellow citizens. (I am something)
