Recovering Biblical Manhood & Womanhood by John and Wayne Grudem covered in chapter Husband and Wives as analogues of Christ and the Church.

- George W. Knight identifies Paul perspective concerning submission in male dominant society by relating it back to Gen 1:18 while using Ephesians 5:21-33 and Colossians 3:18-19
- Though submission has diverse meaning in the New Testament but when used in the context of marriage is for women to submit to their husband within the boundaries of the christian faith.
- We ought to submit to one another out of reverence for Christ which differs from a wife and a husband living in a household.
- There's also submission to authority as Paul urged slaves to submit to their masters but he removed and probited the injustices being done by the slave masters in page 166.
- In conclusion in page 178, “ In short, as analogues of Christ and His church, the husband is asked to exercise, with love, a headship over his and His church, the husband is asked

to exercise with love, a headship over his wife and the wife's is asked to submit, with respect, to her husband.

- In Chapter 10 Wives Like Sarah, and the Husbands Who Honor them
- Peter emphasized Sarah being a good wife while there arises many contradictions as to whether she was a good wife or not.
- Belzekian Denies that Sarah is a model for Christian wives to follow, for the point of Peter's reference to Sarah is that wives in the new covenant can learn from the spiritual ancestress.

- In Discovering Biblical Equality by Pierce we see a variety of discussion that covers equality
- Chapter 10 covers Loving and Submitting To One Another In Marriage by Lynn H. Cohick
