

1. What other media theories do you think might be applied to computer-mediated communication?
 - a. The reversing spiral of silence is another media theory that can also be applied to computer-mediated communication. The reason for this is because people feel entitled to be able to say what they want to when they are behind a computer screen. They feel like they are able to hide and save face by communicating online and not have to deal with the consequences of speaking out. The other media theory could be agenda setting. Many people can be very convincing through their words. By communicating through CMC, people can plan out what exactly they want to say and how to word it correctly in a way that can be very convincing. By writing with conviction, some may be able to push a secret agenda onto someone else without them being fully aware that this was in fact what the other person was doing.
2. How would those media theories need to be adapted to accommodate for the unique characteristics of computer-mediated communication channels?
 - a. These theories would need to be adapted to accommodate for the unique characteristics of CMC channels by individualizing the theories instead of them being more generalistic. I believe that the theories are very generalized for a larger capacity, but in the means of CMC they would need to be more personalized. Most of the time CMC revolves around small to medium sized groups not medium to large sized groups. A way to personalize these theories would be to put the individual interactions

together then view it all as a whole to be able to determine the significance of the interactions. This would apply for both the reversing spiral of silence theory as well as the agenda setting theory. Together they would be able to help define the types of interactions between people through CMC.
