### Answers

4. The difference between modern definitions of history and those we are using for biblical materials is that the Bible includes an interpretation of events and people it describes from a divine perspective.
5. Interpretation should not be confused with doing apologetics or the mere extraction of bare facts from the narrative. Such confusion would subvert the original purpose of the author into substituted purposes that are our own, even a good cause such as the defense of faith.

### Terms

1. Inklusio: A literary technique used to indicate the boundaries of a literary unit by beginning and ending it with the same or parallel terms.
2. Chiasm: a literary technique that inverts the elements in two parallel phrases.
3. Repetition: the recurrence of words or phrases; links together actions, images, motifs, themes, and ideas.
