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

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Agrarian Era and the Kingdom of Israel



At the very top of this pyramid was the “Unitary Political Leader.” The next level was the “Local Elites.” The last level, which held the majority of people, were the “Commoners.” This pyramid showcased the sociopolitical pyramid of the Agrarian Era state-level societies. The pyramid I chose to showcase was the Kingdom of Israel. The image below on the left is the Agrarian Pyramid. Next to that image on the right is the Kingdom of Israel in pyramid form. You can see it says, that the “Pharaoh” is on the top. Next is the “Upper class.” After that is the “Middle Class.” Next comes the “Lower Class.” And on the bottom are the “Slaves and Servants.” One can see that there are some major differences between the two pyramids but there are still some similarities.
