Chapter 17: Research & Writing

1. The image of slavery before the 1500s developed in the Late Agrarian Era were that slavery was a regular part of hierarchy and states that there were different types of slavery depending on what type (domestic or agricultural), the source of slaves (any debt tied to society or foreign war captives), and other factors (gender, social role, or status.)
2. Factors that contributed to the new construction of slavery were of several factors; the scale of slaves' population grew rapidly making a total percentage being slaves. On most of the Caribbean islands, and part of the southern British colonies in North America, and parts of Portuguese Brazil also had slaves making up a percentage and the Caribbean having the most majority of the population and all had one mutual common of plantation agriculture.
3. Since peasants were excluded in the cultural frame of their rulers meaning there were harsher punishment and more labor under certain conditions that would result in deaths so high that there was a need to import more slaves into the workforce and lead to the view on American slave population to be dehumanized more than the norm for global slavery.
4. In the Caribbean 90% of the population were slaves and a small European elite over them that lead to more brutal force and dehumanization rather than theorizing about social structure were the rulers' pick for controlling potential explosive labor force and remained a social fact rather than a cultural image. In southern British colonies of North America invented a crucial theoretical factor for image projection as a tool for social control. Places like Georgia, parts of the Carolinas, and Virginia had plantation economies that the European elite of landowners created and had a mix of poor and Africa slaves.

I am not so sure if I do see much of "slavery" in the act itself remnants in the 21st century America, but I do know that racial comparison is still a thing unfortunately in society, racial profiling, belittling a person of color or background based off race, etc., and I do think that in some areas in states there are jobs or certain elite groups that will not accept or will give partial acceptance if these individuals settle for the lower offer or the lower recognition. I mean someone of color not getting an executive job in an office because they attended community college vs. someone who is white and went to Harvard so it reflects a higher chance of the position being given to them.
