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### The Moshiach

The Hebrew “Moshiach” (sometimes spelled “Messiah” ruler who will save the Jewish ) which means “anointed,” designates a future ruler who will save the Jewish people. In both Jewish and Christians traditions, the phrase is utilized. According to Jewish tradition , the Moshiach ia a monarch who has been appointed by God to bring about peace and prosperity as well as the establishment of God’s Kingdom on Earth. Some Jewish sources refer to the Moshiach as a “Mevaser,” which means “bearer of good tidings.” Levaser is a phrase not frequently used.

The concept of Moshiach (Messiah is a central belief in Judaism and is mention in some books of the Hebrew Bible. The term “Moshiach” comes from the Hebrew word “Mashach,” which means “anointed.” In biblical times, the term was used to refer to individuals who were anointed with oil and set apart for a specific purpose, such as a king or a priest.

In Jewish tradition, The Marshiach is seen as a future leader who will bring an end to current era of suffering and evil, restore the world to a state of peace and prosperity, and establish the Kingdom of God on Earth. The Moshiach is believed to be a human being, chosen by God, who will lead the Jewish people to redemption.

The concept of Marshiach is mention in several books of the Hebrew Bible, including Isaiah, Ezekiel, and Daniel. In these books, the Marhiach is described as a great ruler who will come to save the Jewish people from oppression and lead them to a better future. For example, in the book of Isaiah 11:1-2 , the

Moshiach is described as a person who will be filled with the Spirit of God and will bring justice to the world. There shall come forth a Rod from the stem of Jesse, And a branch shall grow out of his roots. The Spirit of the Lord shall rest upon Him. The Spirit of wisdom and understanding, The Spirit of counsel and might, The Spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord.

Messiah' (Greek, Messias) represents the Aramaic mesiha, Hebrew ham-massiah, 'the Anointed One'. The word expresses an idea characteristic of later Judaism and early Christianity. In the time of Jesus, the Jews were awaiting a Messiah; and it was part of the message, and later the central point in the teaching of His disciples, that He was this Messiah, 'He that cometh'.

In Ancient Israel, The concept of royalty was intrinsically related to the use of oil. Historically, the ability of a king to produce and distribute oil was seen as a critical indicator of his legitimacy as a divinely chosen ruler. When a king was crowned, oil was used to signify God's divine appointment and approval of his authority.

The expression ham-massiah is really a shortened form of messiah YHWH, 'Yahweh's Anointed, the reigning king of Israel. In the ancient east both persons and things were anointed by having sweet-smelling oil poured or smeared over them. For instance, the cultic stone (masebah) was anointed; and thereby worship was offered to the deity who inhabited it or was represented by it. The first anointing of the stone was regarded as the power-conferring act in virtue of which it was set apart as a holy stone; to anoint a stone meant simply to make it a holy stone. When a temple was consecrated, the building, its several parts, and the holy vessels were anointed. Anointing was also used in cultic purification from sickness and defilement.

According to Jewish mythology, Moshiach is the anointed one who will usher in the Messianic Era. The Jewish Messiah, an heir to the throne from the Davidic line who might bring harmony and peace to

the globe, is the most ordinary person for this title to be used. Moshiach is also known as the Messiah ben David in the Hebrew Bible and Talmud (Messiah, son of David). Many hope he will usher in a new period of peace and justice, freeing people from their oppressors and ending all pain and suffering. He will be a brilliant educator and a decisive leader who will bring the Temple back to Jerusalem. He will restore harmony and tranquility to the world and bring about the physical and spiritual restoration of the Jewish people. Moshiach represents the Jewish people's future and their hope for a better world.
