## **Summary**

Chapter 3 deals with the theological foundations of ethics. The chapter focuses on the Christian worldview. Hollinger defines the Christian worldview as the way we put our world together. The chapter begins with theory of Singer. Fundamental to Singers' beliefs is the theory that humans are no different than animals and, morally, they should be treated the same. Hollinger states three world views; a Narrative component, a rational component, and a ritual component. The author states that the heart of Christian beliefs and worldview is the knowledge that God is at the heart

of everything. There can be no proper ethical behavior with God being at the center, and God is at the foundation of Christian ethics. The Christian worldview is rooted in knowing the one true triune God. Hollinger concludes the chapter by stating that the Christian worldview is wrapped up in the story of creation, sin, the fall, redemption, and consummation.
