The late Agrarian Era developed into a culture focused on slavery and racial identity, which significantly began in the Atlantic world and had a lasting effect way beyond the Atlantic world. The images of enslaved person's identity projected by slaveholders and enslaved people since slavery made it part of the complex hierarchies. Great demand needs for slavery, primarily for agriculture. The high-demand slavery market brought about the course that had to change the dynamites of slaves. It communicated that slaves were "lazy and stupid" by their masters. The slaveholder used this method to make the condition and terms more acceptable so that the master could find some justification. Therefore, these were the country images before 1500.

After 1500, the conditions now developed in the Atlantic world offered a new plan for the image of slavery. At first, it was due to the rising population of slaves. But the slaves were never part of the majority of society. It was made clear that slavery was a key to agriculture. However, secondly, it was evident that the peasant population of Atlantic world plantations slaves intentionally excluded from their ruler's cultural frame. They used this to justify the harsh exploitation of slave labor. All this led to the American slave population's view of the worst dehumanized ways of global slavery. Nevertheless, the final step was added, which was the mixture of the racial composition of Atlantic slavery.

New racial construction has developed in the Caribbean and Southern societies. In the Caribbean, the slave population outsizes some islands by 90%, with few elites over them. In British colonies of North America, that race they invented. Southern colonies society between Europeans and African workers was threaten , the social and economic power of the elite. A racial divide remained a social fact instead of a cultural image.

It was as many African slaves-worker vs. European workers. So therefore, the Europeans kept control of their economic means. They justify they did not base it on financial, but as a racial one.
