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1. What is effective feedback?

Effective feedback is a way of providing a student with an explanation of what they are doing correctly and incorrectly in their learning process. It focuses on the student's strengths and provides constructive criticism that can help the student improve.

2. How can feedback inform and help a student?

Feedback can inform a student about their current level of performance and help them understand what they need to do to improve. By knowing where they stand, students can set goals for themselves and work towards achieving them. Feedback can also increase a student's confidence and motivation.

3. What is the difference between feedback and advice?

| Feedback | Advice |
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| Focuses on student's performance, pointing out what they are doing correctly and incorrectly | Focuses on the student's future actions, providing suggestions on how they can improve |
| Is educative in nature, providing an explanation and example of what is accurate and inaccurate about the student's work | Is guidance-oriented, offering recommendations and suggestions |
| Can be given immediately after a task to connect the feedback with the action | Can be given at any time to offer support and guidance |
| Needs to be sensitive to the individual needs of the student, balancing between proper encouragement and avoiding hurting the student's feelings | Can be generic or tailored to the specific needs and circumstances of the student |

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| Feedback | Advice |
| Refers to a skill or specific knowledge | Focuses on the overall growth and development of the student |
| Is meant to keep students "on target" for achievement | Is meant to empower the student with the tools and skills they need to achieve their goals |
| Can be given through various means, such as verbally, non-verbally, or in written form | Is typically given verbally or in written form |
| Concentrates on one ability or skill at a time | Offers a more comprehensive view, addressing multiple skills or abilities |

4. Describe 5 effective feedback practices?

- I. Feedback should be educative in nature and based on what the student is doing correctly.
- II. Feedback should be given promptly, immediately after showing proof of learning.
- III. Feedback should take into account the individual needs of the student.
- IV. Feedback should answer the four questions: What can the student do? What can't the student do? How does the student's work compare with others? How can the student do better?
- V. Feedback should reference a skill or specific knowledge and be provided using tools such as rubrics to provide specific performance information.
