The Crash Course film this week is on the Enlightenment, one of the most important movements of the 1700s. The ideals of Enlightenment led to the American, French & Haitian Revolutions and greatly influenced the manner in which people viewed themselves and their world. As you watch the film, first write what you consider to be the three most important "take-aways" of the Enlightenment and then, second, explain how you believe they illustrate the changing tenets of this time.

Three important takeaways of the Enlightenment are:

1. The importance of reason and scientific inquiry: The Enlightenment was characterized by a focus on reason and empirical evidence, as opposed to traditional authority or dogma.
