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The Wanderers Hávámál is based upon one of the most important mythological poems of the Poetic Edda. It was written in AD 1270. The word Hávámál in English means “Words of the Eye one”. The poem gives you insight of how majority of Odin’s life was and how his magic was used and influenced throughout their culture. Odin is a high god from the Old Norse Pantheon , which contains of two families. One family known as the Aesir , who are the gods of war and destiny. The other known as the Vanir , who are the gods of prosperity and fertility. This poem was spilt into portions of nearly 5 or 6. They all have different meanings behind them. The main sections of the poem are the Gestabáttir , the Loddfáfnismál , & lastly the Rúnatal. The first section listed above focuses mainly on the respect or manners you have for you and your peers around. The second section listed specifies on morals , correct actions , and code of conducts. Lastly , the third section informs you on Odin’s secrets he wanted to share based upon the secret of the Runes. The odd spellings in the name of these sections is the written language of medieval Iceland and Norway. In conclusion this poem tells a bunch of great stories and shares some interesting beliefs.
