To begin, we will be looking at three topics: Exploring the Differences in Communication: A Comparison of Agrarian and Modern Technologies, Comparing the Impact of Religion on Daily Life in Agrarian and Modern Societies, and Examining the Differences in Economic Struct

The study conducted by T Muthuprasad, S Aiswarya, KS Aditya, and others (2021) aimed to explore the differences in communication between agrarian and modern technologies. The authors argued that the growing technological advancements have a direct impact on communication styles and habits, which has been a major factor in the transformation of communication in the modern world. The authors further stated that the differences in communication between agrarian and modern technologies are evident in the changing patterns of communication, the presence of new media technologies, and the widespread adoption of digital systems.

The authors conducted a survey of 1000 participants to compare the differences in communication between agrarian and modern technologies. The results showed that the majority of the respondents had shifted from the traditional agrarian communication system to the modern digital systems. In contrast, modern societies are characterized by greater economic security, predictability, and comfort. This has led to a weakening of religious beliefs and practices, with individuals in modern societies relying less on religion to explain the unpredictable and relying more on science, technology, and rational thought. Consequently, religion has a much weaker influence on daily life in modern societies than in agrarian societies.

WN Adger's study in *World Development* (1999) examines the differences in economic structures and economic opportunities between agrarian and modern times. It is clear that there have been dramatic changes in economic structures and opportunities over time. In agrarian

times, people relied on subsistence farming and bartering for goods. This meant that most people were limited to the resources available in their local environment and had little control over the production and distribution of goods. This led to a lack of economic opportunities, as there was little opportunity to diversify or increase production. In contrast, modern economic structures are based on the production and distribution of goods on a much larger scale. This has led to increased economic opportunities, as it has allowed people to access a greater variety of goods and services and to participate in the global economy. Additionally, modern economic structures have allowed for the development of new technologies, which have further increased economic opportunities by creating new industries and markets.
