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The Christian world view takes us from existence, morals, and knowledge developing our personality of the Christian. Examining creation, the fall of humanity, and reconciliation back to God. However, Sigmund Freud psychodynamic perspective seems to be organized the same way, but the message steers away from God and points to a scientific view. He points out the psychoanalytic system which is the “id” existence, “ego” morals, and “superego” knowledge to be the psychic energy that develops our personality. Which is like the Christian worldview structure of existence, morals, and knowledge that believes God develops the personality of the Christian.

The Christian world view specifies **existence** as obedience to God, dominion over the earth, sea, and animals, replenishing the land, procreating, multiplying in love, peace, honor, worshiping, and trusting God. Yet because of the fall of Adam and Eve we are born in sin, shaped in inequity, without morals, sexually undisciplined, and untamed. Like Christian existence, the psychoanalytic perspective explaining the “id” instinct as untamed, sexually out of control, without morals yet not considered sin, but a natural instinct a human nature that is needed for humanity.

The Christian world view explains the importance of the holy spirit as it leads and guides us helping us to stay **morally** correct under the will of God. We see this behavior in the “ego” instinct as it helps the “id” instinct stay morally correct, according to Freud.

The **knowledge** in the Christian world view explains Jesus Christ as the Savior of the world who came to save us and not judge the sinner. Like Christian knowledge, the superego stops the “ego” from over judging the “id’.

It is the blessed assurance of the Father, Son, Holy Spirit, known as the trinity, that governs Christian behavior. The scientific view of the id, ego, and superego, seems to be derived from the trinity of God, but on the opposing side, therefore is not of God, in my opinion.
