Outline of information we are presenting:

- **Importance of parents being aware of what a student is doing on the internet. Ask parental permission**

- the internet can be a great place for research, communicating with peers, and playing games
- but the internet also comes with risks such as cyberbullying, inappropriate content, or online predators
- parents can help monitor what students are doing online including what they are searching, or who they may be talking to
- asking parents for permission allows them to make sure what you are doing on the internet is safe
- they can make sure you are not talking to anyone you do not know, or visiting dangerous websites

- **Why you can't trust people behind a screen**

- people should not be trusted behind a screen, because they may not be who they say they are
- they can use fake name, fake pictures, and fake information to pretend to be someone they are not

- **Never meet up with somebody you meet online**

- this can be dangerous, because as we said before people can pretend to be someone they are not
- this means you could be meeting up with someone you do not know
- this can be very dangerous
- if you ever make a friend online and want to meet them, tell your parents and make sure they are with you so that you can be safe

- **Cyberbullying→ what it is and how we can avoid this**

- cyberbullying is bullying through the internet
- this is usually done through messaging
- this could be sending threatening messages, making fun of how someone looks, prank calling people, hacking somebody's personal account, or spreading rumors
- if any of this is done online it is considered cyberbullying
- we can avoid cyberbullying by being nice
- if you would not say it in person you should not say it through the screen because it is just as hurtful as real words
- if you see or know someone that is getting cyberbullying including yourself, you should report it to a trusted adult

- **We do not share our passwords**

- never share your passwords with anyone, and make sure they are in a safe place where they cannot be accessed by anyone

- if you share your password with someone you never know who else they may share it with

- giving your passwords can give people access to your personal information

- emails, date of birth, pictures of you, and other things

- **We don't give out personal information like where we live**

- do not give out any personal information to anyone over the internet

- do not give out emails, passwords, ss numbers, phone numbers, birth dates

- you never know who might see this information, even if you know the person you sent it to

- things such as where you live can put you in danger, if this information is given to a bad person

- this can put you in danger

- also giving people access to your personal information, can give them the ability to pretend to be you
