### **Understanding Analysis**

This text discusses the importance of analysis in writing and how putting academic disciplines into practice will provide fresh perspectives on various issues. Developing analytical skills enables you to turn your unique point of view into valuable contributions to academic and professional inquiry. The chapter points out the way analysis helps you understand a variety of issues, offers specific procedures for analyzing to apply, and how to write up an analysis.

In the article English, author Robert Scholes said the field of English is divided and redivided by opposites using two main gestures of differentiation. Scholes split the subjects into two groups, literature and non-literature. Scholes views that distinction as unfair and concludes that we as a society value literary writings highly and consider non-literary works to be unworthy of our attention.

A summary of Robert Scholes' argument is that non-literature can be taught. His analysis concluded that consumption of text was more valuable than production of text. Using a simple diagram, Scholes illustrates the structure of English literature.
