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This week was officially my third week of Clinical and I worked on the Med Surg unit which is on the 8b floor of Lincoln Hospital in the Bronx, with RN, Ms. Farrell. The greatest challenge I faced was working in a hospital environment was the nurse is assigned to a lot of patients, therefore I had to wait until she got to the patient that I was assigned to give me more information about the patient. The patient is a 39-year-old, male, he is diagnosis with DKA which is diabetic ketoacidosis, he has no known allergies and his AHCD is full code. He is alert and oriented times 3 to person, place, and time, he has no history of Cardiac, his respiratory is Room Air. The patient skin was intact he had no lesion, no ulcer, his lungs was clear, he was not connected to any oxygen, he had an IV. His temp was 98.3, pulse was 92, RR was 18, B/P was 109/76 and O2 was 100. He has regular diet, he is continent and was able to walk to the bathroom on his own and void, but he had no bowel movement, and he had a steady gait. He was connected to an IV primary and piggyback line. The patient needed potassium and NoVo lock for blood thinner and he's being monitored, and insulin was given as order. While proceeding throughout my shift I was able to learn a lot from the nurse, she showed me how to flush the IV line and informed that the line needed to be flushed at all times.
