Family Dysfunction in "*Fences*"

The Author August Wilson in the play "*Fences*" tells us Troy Maxson being the Father and the breadwinner in this Maxson's family and ultimately causes family dysfunction in the end. Troy is Father of three children. First child Lyons is born out of wedlock, comes Cory who is the only legitimate child with Troy's current wife Rose. Later in the play there is an additional child named Raynell who came after Troy cheats his wife. In this play Troy is a very strong, hardworking man of color who takes care of his family. At the same time he is bitter because he couldn't accomplish his dreams because of racial segregation he faced back in his days as he grew up, from all these distractions and unbearable frustrations in life. Troy's past was very difficult and impoverished after being abandoned by his poor father who raised him and his siblings under very harsh conditions. He extends this to his son Cory and apparently caused much dysfunction, by doing so much of control and at the same time feared his son will as well go through the same fate as a black young man.

In the play "Fences" written by August Wilson, Troy Maxson is mostly the main

character who is a hard, tough love family man. He plays a huge role in this play with a bunch of titles of which some he has revealed to be strong as a man of

color by working so very hard and providing for his family and being weak by revealing his bitterness from the past. This ultimately puts apart his small family

becoming so dysfunctional, he did not achieve His dream as a baseball player because of the racial segregation he encountered when growing up as a man of color. She was treated unfairly by her husband as he cheated on her and had a girlfriend resulting in the baby and loss of the baby's mother. Rose embraces the child and takes care like her own. But she punishes Troy for his wrongdoing and the relationship was so dysfunctional until the time of Troy's death.

Cory is the only child who was born in this legitimate marriage between Troy and Rose, whilst Lyons and Raynell were from different mothers and were his half siblings. His initial career

Football was hindered by his father who kept reflecting on his failure through racial challenges he faced as a black man back in his days. Cory later joined the Military but got disconnected to his father until the time of his Father's death. He shows respect by attending the Father's funeral but bitterness haunts him until his mother calms him down.

" Fences " signifies in the play some protection which seem never to be accomplished as Troy wanted to put a fence to protect his family from outsiders but indeed he became couldn't make it, ultimately failed by adding more problems to his family cheating his wife outside of their marriage.

The symbols are the baseball bat which Troy kept for so many years and always reminded him of the discrimination that hindered his career . The other symbol is death .Troy kept on talking about death and how he has gained victory over it but finally it overpowered him and he finally died.

I also learned not to trust people so too much .As a woman looking at the life of Rose , she was so sincere, honest and very genuine but little did she know her husband was cheating on her.
