Summary of Service Outcome and Support Progress

Outcome # 1

Outcome statement with measurable and observable criteria for outcome achievement: Once daily, Davis will use his communication board to indicate a musical choice in 90% of all opportunities over the next year.

Summary of progress toward achieving this outcome: Davis has met this outcome in 100% of all opportunities.

Recommendation for implementing this outcome: Continue Change Discontinue

Rationale for the recommendation: Davis has been very consistent with this outcome. It is suggested that we change it to include handing his plate to staff when he is done with lunch. We think that Davis communicates that he is done with an item by throwing it. This outcome allows Davis to focus on work on that skill.

Outcome # 2

Outcome statement with measurable and observable criteria for outcome achievement: Once daily, Davis will indicate a staff and/or peer that he would like to visit in 90% of all trials over the next year.

Summary of progress toward achieving this outcome: Davis has met this outcome in 98% of all opportunities.

Recommendation for implementing this outcome: Continue Change Discontinue

Rationale for the recommendation: Davis has really shown a lot of interest in this outcome. He enjoys visiting his friends and staff and has created new relationships. It is suggested that we change this outcome to include identifying 2 people he would like to visit.

Description of the person's status

Health: Davis has been in good health over the last 6 months. For a little while he had been complaining about knee pain, but that seems to have stopped.

What is currently important to the person and for the person: It is important to Davis that he has time to get out of his chair to sit in the recliner or get on the mat. It is also important to him that he has consistent staff in his programming space and to have 1:1 time with those staff. It is important to Davis that he has time throughout his day to use his iPad. It is important for Davis to have a balance of time on the iPad and time engaging in activities. It is also very important for Davis to have his "first this, then this, next this" board. It is important to Davis that he has a route and is with staff that understand his communication.

Status of social relationships and natural supports: Davis continues to live with his parents, and they are both very important to him. There are several staff and peers that Davis seems to enjoy spending time with. Due to the coronavirus, Davis stays in the same room every day, but that has given him the opportunity to spend time with new staff and persons served.

Recent inclusion and participation in the community: Davis has not visited the community while at PAI due to the coronavirus.

New or ongoing opportunities for the development and exercise of functional and age-appropriate skills, decision making and choice, personal advocacy, and communication:

Functional and age-appropriate skills: Davis loves music therapy! He enjoys playing the instruments and engaging with his peers and staff during the sessions. He will reach out and play the instruments independently with a big smile on his face. Davis also really seems to enjoy participating in meaningful movement activities like bean bag toss, frisbee golf, and beachball toss. Again, Davis will participate with a huge smile on his face and will laugh after tossing the item.

Decision making and choice: Davis makes choices about his schedule and daily activities using the iPad, picture cards, and answering yes/no questions. He is provided options throughout his day to make choices and decisions. His decisions are honored. He has been using a daily schedule with pictures and a picture communication board at PAI.

Personal advocacy: Davis may advocate for himself verbally through answering questions. He would like to be encouraged and supported in his communication to continue having his needs and preferences met. It is also important that Davis have support people around him that know him well and advocate for the needs and desires that he may not be able to communicate to the appropriate team members.

Communication: Davis may communicate verbally. Davis will reach for things he would like. Davis will also move toward things or activities he would like to do. Davis will laugh and engage when he likes something. When not interested in an activity or not engaged, he may leave, throw things on to the floor, or attempt to use the iPad instead. Davis has been communicating verbally a lot more answering yes/no questions. He also enjoys talking with the office assistant, Nancy.

Status of the person's civil and legal rights: Davis' mother and father, Mary and Dave, are his legal guardians. Davis' civil and legal rights are maintained at PAI. Davis would like to continue to be aware of his rights, and have a support team who upholds his rights, and advocates on his behalf. Davis would like to continue having his communication honored and make choices and decisions throughout his day.
