

CAPITALIZATION:

Capitalize names of religions and religious denominations. Ex.— Hindu faith Methodist

Remember: Capitalize races, ethnic groups, and nationalities. Ex.— the Maravi people
Do not capitalize the word after a semicolon (;) unless it is a proper noun or a proper adjective.
Ex.— Take it; it's hot!

1. senegal's major ethnic group is wolof; the majority of people are of the islamic faith.
Senegal's major ethnic group is Wolof; the majority of people are of the Islamic faith.

PUNCTUATION:

Remember: An appositive is a word or words that add additional information about a noun (or a pronoun). Use a comma or commas to set off an appositive.

Ex.— Do you want to meet Jade, my friend?
Jade, my friend, will arrive soon.

Note: Technically, a one-word appositive may or may not be set off by commas.

Ex.— His dog, Cash, is a boxer. or His dog Cash is a boxer.

2. Janell my aunts friend has moved to 3 W Rocking Horse Blvd Arlington VA 22213

Janell, my aunt's friend, has moved to 3 W. Rocking Horse Blvd.,
Arlington, VA 22213

PHRASES/CLAUSES:

A phrase is two or more words without a subject and a verb.

Ex.— prepositional phrase: in that chair verb phrase: must earn
participial phrase: having skied infinitive phrase: to be a doctor

An independent clause can stand alone as a complete thought (sentence).

Ex.— On Saturday night, Lilah will leave for Kansas.

A dependent clause has a subject and a verb; however, it cannot stand alone as a complete thought.

Ex.— Because Tate found a job

CAPITALIZATION:

1. the jacks mt. road covered bridge, built in 1890, still exists near camp david in fairfield, pa.
The Jacks Mt. Road Covered Bridge, built in 1890, still exists near Camp David in Fairfield, PA.

PUNCTUATION:

If a participial phrase begins a sentence, place a comma after it.

Ex.— Bending over, the soccer player breathed heavily.

Place a comma before and after a phrase within a sentence if it interrupts the flow of thought.

Ex.— The soccer player, bending over, breathed heavily.

2. Examining the solution the forensic scientist swirled the test tube and frowned

Examining the solution, the forensic scientist swirled the test tube and frowned.

CLAUSES:

A clause contains a subject and a verb.

An independent clause can stand alone as a sentence.

Ex.— Some nurses want to volunteer.

A command may have you understood as its subject. It is still a complete thought.

Ex.— Go away. (You) Go away.

A dependent clause cannot stand alone as a complete thought (sentence).

Ex.— If your dog is sick

Write IC if the clause is independent; write DC if the clause is dependent.
